A Round Up of Season 02/03 match reports, provided and posted on the Tarleton RUFC website, can be found in this report:

First XV

Tarleton 1st XV has set new standards this season.

At the time of writing, there are innumerable highlights to the season. The side has set new records whilst winning the North West B Teams League having only had one league defeat all season.

Over 830 points have been scored, whilst in the league only an average of 7 points a game have been conceded. This has to be a point of special praise for the defence throughout the season where each and every player has been exceptional.

The specific game highlights have to be a double over the reigning champions for the previous three seasons, Preston Grasshoppers and in a spectacular display of running rugby the 65-5 demolition of a very good Vale of Lune side.

On an individual viewpoint, many players have had outstanding seasons. It seems unfair to specifically name players when others have created their chances, but to set the records for future years the leading try scorer in the backs is currently Jim Goulden with 16, whilst in the forwards, Kev Strange, 1st team captain, has contributed 15 tries.

Leading points scorer for the season is the evergreen Mark Powell who has amassed 189 points and this included a club record 30 points in one game.

A special note also for the club captain John Sutton and Nick Brown who, both on and off the field, have contributed a great deal to the success of the season.

At the start of the season we set out with the target of winning the title for the first time. It is known a number of people were sceptical of the ability of the side and what they might achieve. The players have very firmly made all those people eat their words.

However, we must look to the future. We have been accepted into the RFU leagues and start next season in North Lancs Division 2. We have also been invited to the North Riding Senior Sevens in Scarborough an event to which the likes of the Samurais, Crusaders and Wakefield have been invited. This is a great honour for Tarleton and one which we should use to celebrate our season as well as testing ourselves against players of proven quality.

Under 13s

Under 7s and Under 8s

These two teams operated as a combined squad this season, largely due to the age mix of the players. Out of the squad of twenty-two children only five were under eights the remainder were under sevens or younger.

For the sevens, the high point of the season has probably been completing the double over local rivals Southport, winning six nil at Birkdale and then completing a narrow four tries to three win at Sporting Edge in the return fixture. Their low point is without doubt having a total of eleven postponed fixtures.

For the eights there have been quite a few highlights; the double over Southport, the twelve tries to one victory over Collegiate, and most recently the victories over Bolton and Cockermouth. But pride of place must go to the double registered against our sporting rivals Ormskirk RUFC who were roundly beaten six tries to four and then on their own dust bowl by sixteen scores to ten.

Their only low points have been when poor displays cost them matches against Leigh and Altrincham, whilst the defeat at home to a very talented and mature West Park side was one step too far for our "young" eights side.

In summing up I would issue two challenges for next season, one for the players and one for the club;

The players who remain at under eights next season must go out and build on this season's achievement. Consolidate on what they have learned, then add the skills and nous to produce a team to be reckoned with next year.

The club needs to recruit some more players to enable the hand full of players who move up to nines next season to field a team and thereby continue to enjoy playing this great game.
